Things to Keep in Mind for World Languages

- You need one year of foreign language or . fine art to graduate from ORHS.
- California State Universities and the Univer-• sity of California *require* two years of the same for eign language but recommend three years.
- You can start a language in any year, but if you want to take advanced classes (level 4 or AP), you should start by the fall of your freshman year.
- You will have more flexibility in vour schedule for advanced courses if you start languages in your freshman year.
- Oak Ridge offers college credit for Spanish . and French classes starting in level 3.
- You can earn college credit by taking an AP . (Advanced Placement) language class in French or Spanish.

Why Study World Languages?

- *The World Economy* As the United States becomes more economically interdependent with other nations, Americans in business will need to speak languages other than English in order to communicate with business associates in other lands. Workers who can speak another language will have an edge over those who cannot.

- State Seal of Biliteracy
- Students who complete a level 4 language class may qualify for the State Seal of Biliteracy on their diplomas.

- Here in the U.S. French and French Creole are the 4th most widely spoken languages in the U.S.
- **Business** France is one of the leading host countries of American investments in Europe, and 1200 French businesses have operations in America, employing 500,000 workers. US companies



employ around 600,000 people in France. In 2006, the US exported and imported more to countries having French as a national language than to countries having any other foreign language. The province of Quebec in Canada is our sixth largest trading partner.

Diplomacy After English, French is the most popular official language of countries around the world and one of six official languages of the United Nations. French is spoken on five conti-

nents and 28 nations have French as an official language. 220 million people speak French worldwide and 75 million speak French as a first language. French is widely spoken in Africa.
